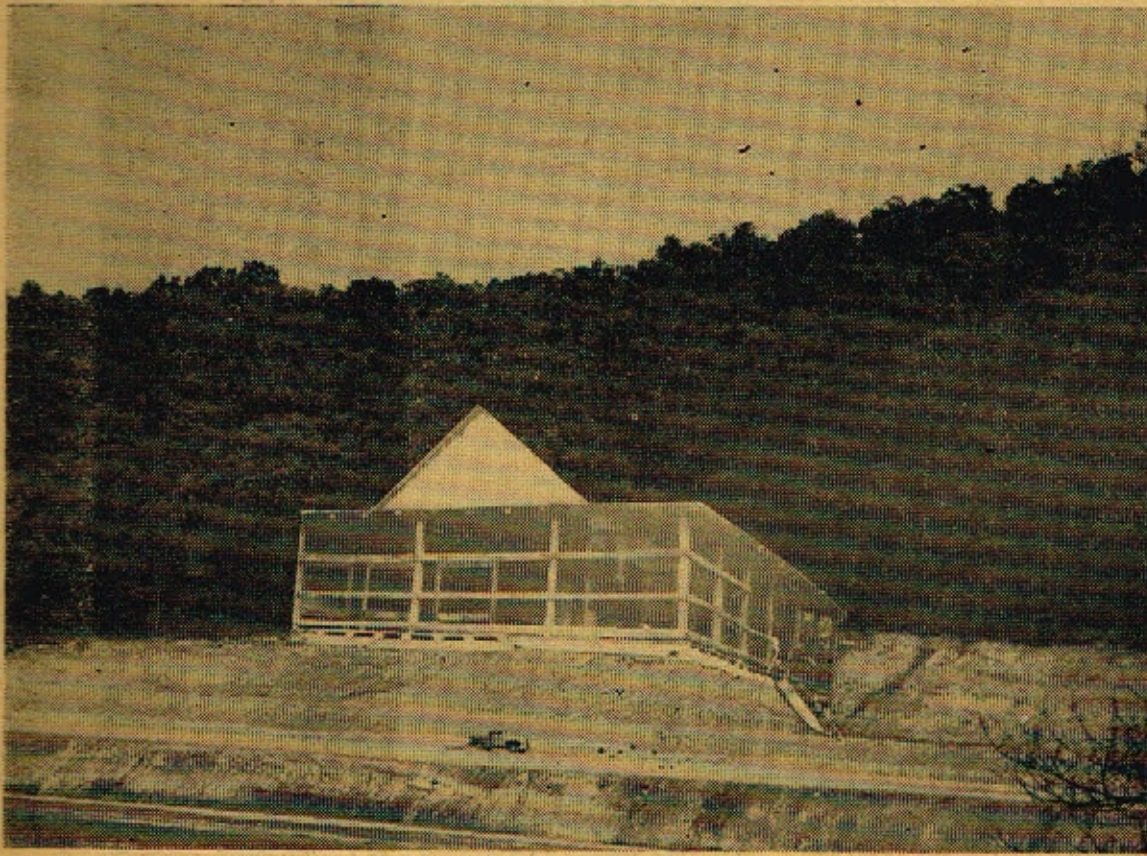


Big Uranium Discovery Assures New School; Deposit Found On Playground

Students Will Be Dismissed To Work; Janitor Brannon Says Geiger Counter Valuable Item Despite Its Low Cost

Atomic Energy Head Ray Burroughs Will Supervise Construction Of New Educational Plant

Uranium, the important explosive material of the atom bomb, was discovered on the Glenville high school playground Friday by Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, Ray "Atom Bomb" Burroughs, and Chairman of Congress' Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, Glenn Varner. Mr. Burroughs and Mr. Varner were called from Washington to investigate the plot of land, which according to the janitor, Bob Brannon contained a metal that attracted his geiger counter, a uranium detector.

The \$500,000 bonus which was given to the high school because of this important discovery will be used to begin the construction of the new high school plant. Further payments from the government for the uranium will be more than enough to finish the project.

The high school plant will consist of ten buildings, a gym with three playing floors, a swimming pool, and twenty rooms for health classes; a music building; a printing school; an auditorium with a seating capacity of 50,000; a home economics building containing adequate equipment for 1,000 students; a home in which to practice home management; a modern cafeteria; a vocational agriculture building; a training hospital, which will be under the direction of Marlyn Kirkpatrick, a graduate of John Hopkins University; and an administration building with 150 rooms. Plans are also being made for a new football and baseball field with modern lighting equipment, concrete bleachers, and a huge field house.

Mr. Burroughs will personally supervise the mining of the uranium and will have the cooperation of a committee consisting of Mr. Jennings Harper, Mr. Garrett Jenkins, Mr. Kenneth Waggy, and Mr. Ted Foster, who were appointed by Mr. Harry S. Truman.

For the excavation, picks, shovels, tractors and bulldozers have been distributed among the high school students who will operate them for a salary of \$20 a day. The workers shall be provided with meals which will be served by the faculty in the barn opposite the old high school building.

With all students working to their greatest extent, the high school project will be completed in the near future. Until then all students are excused from their classes.

The Atomic Energy Commission, Mr. Burroughs, has selected 125 employees of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to guard the uranium deposit day and night as a caution against Russian spies.

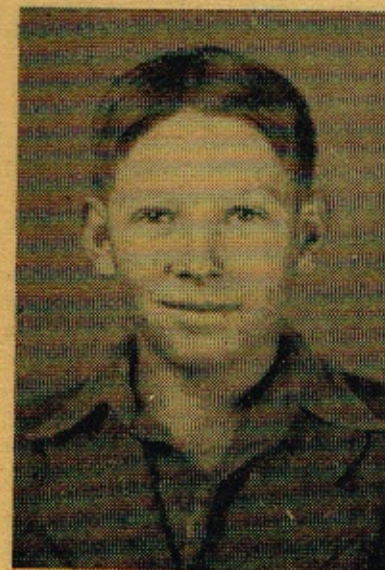

Mr. Cawthon says that the new station will not be the strongest in the country, but it will reach as far as Clarksburg and other towns surrounding Glenville. It's closest rival will be the TV station recently put into operation at Normantown. The antenna for the Glenville transmitter will be placed on the top of Turner Brothers lumber company building and the studio will be located at the corner of Main and Bridge streets in Glenville.

Slugger Post Signs With St. Louis Cards

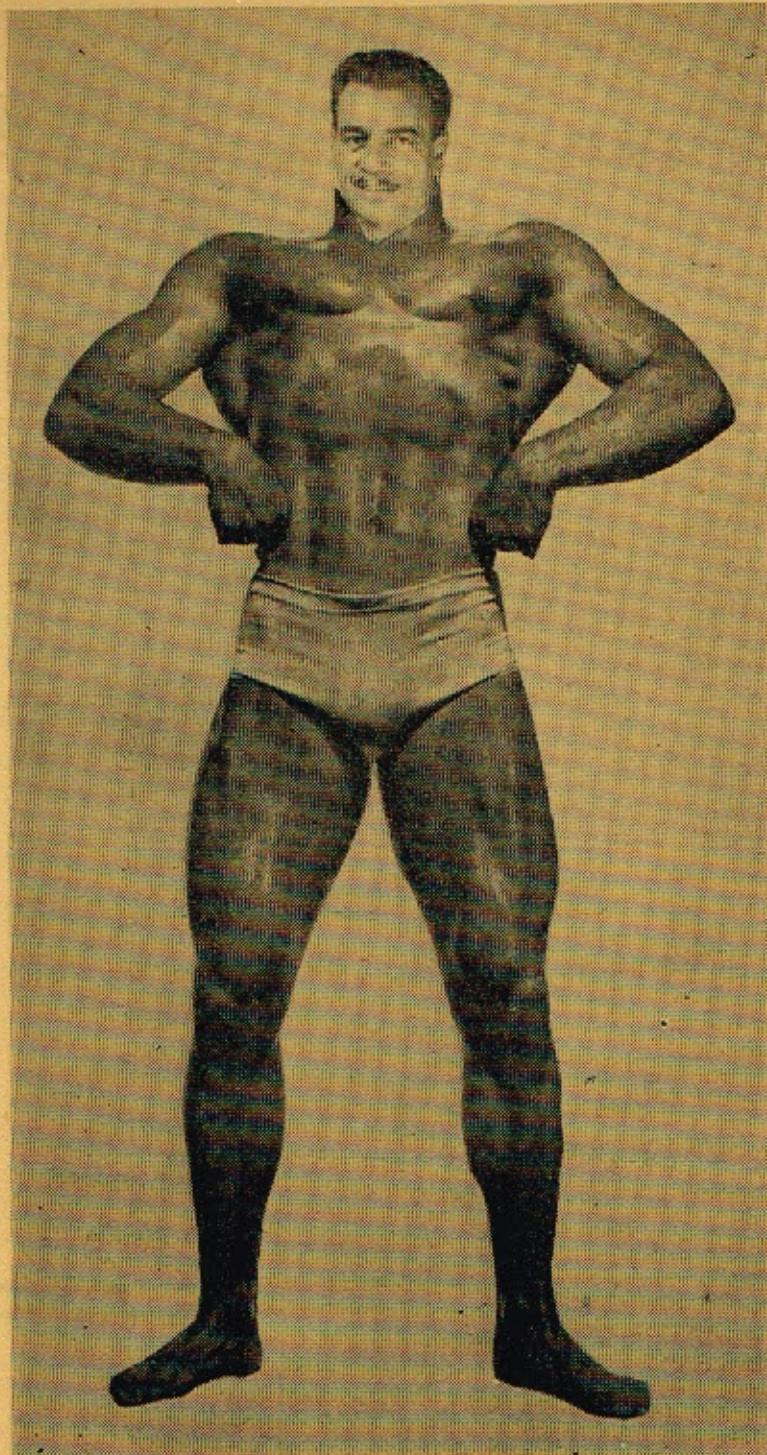

feed them to the Russian army for Thanksgiving dinner. The assassins thought with the present manpower shortage, it would be better to save some of the peasants to munch on during the Easter Parade. Ray (Atom Bomb) Burroughs will replace Richards, who plans to leave for Moscow as soon as the present crisis clears up. It was thought all along that Richards was connected with the Communists, but nobody dared say anything about the matter for fear they would be impeached. When President Harry Truman heard of Richard's success, he had nothing but praise for the lanky West Virginian who can make an atomic bomb do anything but wash dishes. Mr. Truman went on to wish Richards the best of luck and said that he was sorry that the U. S. was losing such a notable character. Richards should fit very well into the present situation in the Russian government, considering that he wholly approves of the new musical system in Russia. The only song the people are allowed to sing is "Peace on Earth, More Power to Me". Anybody caught singing or humming anything other than the official tune will be sentenced to 99 years of hard labor in the Salt mines of Siberia, or be deported to Lower Siberia for lifetime.
