She is a representative in the Glenville high school student council and is active in young people's work in the church and 4-H club. She writes a weekly column for the Glenville Democrat.

The White House Conference is called by the president of the U. S. each ten years. The first in 1910 by Theodore Roosevelt, the second in 1920 by Woodrow Wilson, the third in 1930 by Herbert Hoover, the fourth by Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1940, and this one by Harry S.

Survey Conducted In High Schools By Satellite Staff

Several Instruments Of Former Glenville Sand May Be Used

A recenit survey throughout the high schools in Gilmer county by the Satellite staff shows that 287 students are interested in participating in a Gilmer county band, should one be organized. The five high schools reported interested students in this manner: Tanner high school, 40; Troy high school, 43; Sand Fork high school, 63; Normantown high school, 66; and Glenville high school, 75,

Twelve uniforms and eleven band instruments, formerly used in the now defunct Gilmer county band, have been located by members of the Satellite staff.

Members of the Gilmer County Board of Education recently expressed their willingness to cooperate in the reorganization of a band.

A few years ago there was a band in Glenville high school but because of the lack of interest and directors, it was discontinued. Mrs. Phyllis Rohrbough, who took Mr. Samuel Stewart's position, was the last band director here.

First Band In Gilmer County Was Led By Frank Beall And Will Kee

The first band in Gilmer County | Stewart's place as band director. had its beginning a great many years ago when Frank Beall and Will Kee had two separate bands here made up of small boys who were interested in playing musical instruments.

When Earl R. Boggs, came here in 1933, there was no band. In 1935, however, the Gilmer county board of education hired Frank Beall as a county band instructor. Mr. Beall served from 1935 to 1941. In 1941 Samuel Stewart came to Gilmer county as band instructor replacing Mr. Beall. In March 1942 Mr. Stewart was inducted into the army, again leaving a vacancy.

Did you ever wonder why a fram- | teacher. Gilco is hanging in room 13? This paper was the first paper to be school. Each week the publishing of this paper was done at a different school. The Gilco hanging in room 13 was published at Cedarville.

When the publishing of the Gilco was discontinued in 1935, schools published individual papers such as the Satellite of Glenville high school, Miss Virginia Hall, who is now the fifth grade teacher, was the first instructor of the journalism class which published a paper. Miss Hall directed the publishing of the Satellite until 1937 when Miss Pearl Pickens became the journalism

Miss Pickens taught ed picture of a newspaper called the journalism until 1944 when she was transferred to Tanner high school. During the absence of Miss Pickens, published in a Gilmer county high Mr. Earl Boggs, who was the principal at that time, replaced her. Miss Pickens returned to Glenville the next year and continued to be the advisor of the Satellite until 1947.

In the school year 1947-48 there was no paper printed. With the coming of Coach Wolfe in 1948, the Satellite was printed once more and is still sponsored by him.

When the Satellite was under the direction of Mr. Wolfe, Randall Luzader and Richard Dean Riddle were the first editors. Last year Christine Hyer was the editor.
