
Mary Lee Walters, freshman, returned to school the past Monday after having recovered from a recent appendicitis operation.

One of the most popular of the newer books, "The Life of Lou Gehrig," is now available in the library. Written by Richard G. Hubler, this book portrays the life of the idol of thousands of baseball fans who loved and admired the great man who was the Iron Horse of baseball.

How a poor German boy rose fro mnothing to be America's most popular diamond player and to be recognized by many as the greatest first baseman of all time, is expertly portrayed in this book. How he smashed record after record, played in over 2,000 consecutive games, and broke all home run records, is told also. And when a dreaded illness fastened its grip upon him, his courage was remarkable. Gehrig is not portrayed as a superman, but merely as a poor boy who overcame his difficulties and made good.

# **WESTON MINUTEMEN FALL TO RED TERRORS** 51-31 AS BOB WHITING SCORES 19 POINTS

Large Crowd Sees Terrors Win G. H. S. TO PLAY SPENCER, Second Game From Team of Former Coach; Terrors Hit Stride in Third Quarter.

The Glenville Red Terrors, after leading 25-13 at the half, pulled away in the third quarter and went on to defeat Weston High here the past Tuesday 51-31. The game, which was played before a packed house was hard-fought on both sides. It was the 14th straight win for the Terrors.

Both teams started off slow as far as scoring was concerned and by the end of the first quarter the Terrors were leading by four points, 11-7. In the second quarter Whiting scored frequently for the Terrors and at halftime they were ahead 25-13. The Red Terrors, picking up speed in the third quarter against a reckless Minutemen team, outscored their opponents 17-10, and, with substitutes playing the final quarter, held Weston at bay and won by a decisive 51-31 margin.

This game was the highlight of the Terrors' home season. A large cheering section supportof rooters from Weston accompanied their team to Glenville. This was the second time this year the locals had beaten their former coach, C. D. "Red" Wilfong, having defeated Weston on Jan. 5 at Weston by 47-40.

As usual it was the everreliable Bob Whiting who led the scoring, tallying 19 points and playing his usual fine floor game. He was followed in the scoring by Terror forward Ronnie Gainer and Watson, center of Weston, with 11 each. Ted Fultineer scored 9 points.

150 utility bags (Navy blue), 100 pairs house slippers, 24 men's bed jackets, 4 Afghans, 24 lap boards, 12 canes, 100 ash trays, and as many games as can be sent. The quota goes to the Naval Operating Base at Norfolk, Va., and the Norfolk Naval Hospital, Portsmouth, Va.

Part of the games and all metal coat hangers will go to Red Cross Area Headquarters, Alexandria, Va., for shipment to the camps.

We are asked to exceed our quota if possible, especially in house slippers, bed jackets, and lap boards, says Miss Lewis.

The money from the penny banks goes to buy materials to make these articles.
