BLACKOUT INSTRUCTIONS

Earl R. Boggs, director of Civilian Defense for Gilmer County, has issued the following instructions to be followed during blackouts:

"Now blackouts are a part of your BUSINESS. Preparing for them is necessary for your protection. A partial blackout for Glenville is scheduled for October 14. The County blackout will be scheduled October 21.

For most business establishments blackouts are not difficult but to get information to each one is a difficult task. We shall all need to study the following suggestions before the dates for blackouts:

(1) Normal Lighting of all kinds—signs, window lighting, protective lighting, et cetera, should be continued up to the actual time for blackout and then restored to normal way consistent with military requirements. Do you have switches installed on the outside of your building so a responsible person, such as yourself or another person designated and trained by the Civilian Defense Council, can turn your light off and on? REMEMBER! THIS MUST BE DONE IN LESS THAN 5 MINUTES.

(2) If you need to retain general lighting during blackout, it should be shielded so that absolutely no light will show out through glass windows, doors or other openings. Otherwise, they must be covered. See what you can do about this with ma-

FACULTY AND STUDENTS WORK IN VARIOUS WAYS TO HELP WAR EFFORT

The students and teachers of Glenville High School have done a great deal to aid the war effort during the past year. Many bought war bonds and stamps regularly. During January alone \$1332 was spent for bonds and stamps by the students and teachers. The manual training classes, under the direction of W. E. Hull, worked on a project of building model airplanes for government use.

A class in knitting was held under the direction of Mrs. Murphy and Miss McGee and several articles were completed for the Red Cross.

Each home room sponsor conducted a 10 hour first aid course, in which all the students took part. All the teachers either took, or had had, the regular 20 hour First Aid course which was taught by Mr. Greer from Charleston.

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Citizens Must Put Out All Lights; County-Wide Total Blackout to Follow Oct. 28.

A partial blackout will be held in Glenville on Wednesday night sometime between the hours of 8:00 and 12:00, according to Supervisor John T. Flynn. During the partial blackout street lights will be left on but citizens must put their lights out. A county-wide total blackout will follow two weeks later, on October 28.

It has been announced that normal lighting should be continued up to the actual time for the blackout, and then restored to normal when the all-clear signal is given.

Following is an ordinance of the town of Glenville relating to blackout regulations and air raid precautions:

"Be it ordained by the Common Council of the Town of Glenville, West Virginia:

Section 1. Definitions: As used in this ordinance the following words and phrases shall mean:

'Air Raid Warning Signal' shall mean a signal by the town fire siren, or other audible device of two minutes duration, consisting of either a fluctuating or warbling signal of varying pitch or a succession of intermittent blasts of about five seconds duration separated by a silent period of about three seconds, or by any other and different signal adopted and promulgated by the County Civilian Defense Organization.

'All Clear Signal' shall mean a continuous signal by the town fire siren, or other audible device, of two minutes duration at a steady pitch, or another and different signal adopted and promulgated by the County Civilian Defense Organization.

'Period of Air Raid Alarm' shall mean the interval of time

TERRORS LOSE 1ST CONFERENCE GAME TO RICHWOOD HIGH

Fultineer and Whiting Score As Glenville Is Overpowered By a Heavy Nicholas Eleven

The Glenville Red Terrors lost their third game in four starts Saturday to Richwood, 13-12. The Terrors were outweighed about 15 lbs. to the man. This loss dropped Glenville from a tie for first to a tie in third place in the Conference.

Richwood went out in front in the first period when Nichols raced around right end. The try for the extra point failed. Then the Terrors finally came to life after Fultineer intercepted a pass and raced about 60 yards for Glenville's first touchdown. Late in the third quarter Whiting plunged through the line for 20 yards and the Terrors' second touchdown. Yeager's drop-kick was wide.

Late in the fourth period Shelton plunged over from the one-yard line for the tying touchdown. Nichols then plunged through right tackle for the extra point and the winning point. Nichols was the outstanding player for Richwood.

between the giving of the air raid warning signal and the giving of the next succeeding all clear signal.

'Blackout Structures' shall mean any space so enclosed that any illumination maintained or existing therein is not visible from any point outside such enclosure.

Section 2. Authority to Promulgate Necessary Orders, Rules and Regulations for Blackouts and Air Raids. For the proper regulation of traffic during the period of air raid alarm, and the obscuration, diminution or extinguishment of any illumination, whether in or out of doors, which increases the vulnerability of the territory covered by the ordinance, or any portion thereof, to air attack, the Gilmer County Civilian Defense Council may adopt and promulgate reasonable rules and regulations for such purposes, and any rules or regulations so adopted shall remain in effect for thirty (30) days thereafter, but no longer unless approved within said time by resolution of the Common Council of the Town of Glenville; provided, however, that any rule or regulation so adopted by such organization or council may at any time be rescinded by reso-

lution of the Town Council. Violation of any such rule or regulation while the same is in force and effect is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor, with punishment and penalty as hereinafter provided.

Section 3. General Orders, Rules and Regulations to be in Writing. All general orders, rules and regulations adopted and promulgated as provided in Section two, above, shall be in writing, and posted in various conspicuous places for the information of the general public, and when given reasonable publication by posting they shall be given effect when dealing with violations thereof, whether the violator had read the same or not.

Section 4. For the purpose of proper enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance or the Rules and Regulations adopted and promulgated under sections two and three, above, Special Defense Police may be appointed by the Town Council or the Civilian Defense Council, in addition to all town, county and state peace officers, and shall be designated by an arm band with the letters used by the Civilian Defense Organization to designate the Auxiliary Police.

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terials that you have on hand.

(3) If you have protective lighting in front of safes, cash drawers, or other places, it must be shielded so that no light rays will shine out to the street to be reflected upward by passing vehicles or other objects. It is the desire of the West Virginia State Police that you shield such protective lights rather than put them out. This guards against burglary and vandalism.

(4) If you have any outdoor lighting, other than gas or electric, arrangements must be made to have it turned off in less than 5 minutes after the warning has sounded.

You understand, of course, the requirements of the L. C. D. do not demand that you turn off all lights during a blackout, nor does it suggest any curtail-

ment of your normal use except that you be fully prepared for an effective blackout. You will be responsible to your Aid Raid Warden for complete blackout. Remember, someone from Gilmer County Defense Council will call on you and help you out with your problems.

Your "all out" cooperation is vital to the success or failure of this program, not only for your safety but for the protection of the citizens of the County.

This is Gilmer County's first line of "offense"! Do NOT make unnecessary use of telephone during blackouts.

PARTIAL BLACKOUT

(Continued From Page Three)

Section 5. Unauthorized Warning or All Clear Signals Prohibited. Any person who shall operate a siren, whistle, horn or other audible device in such manner as to simulate an air raid alarm signal or an all clear signal, except on order of the proper authority, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 6. No Municipal or Private Liability. The Town of Glenville, a body corporate, or any private person, shall not be liable to any person, firm, corporation, or association for damages sustained by them during a blackout or air raid, where such damage or injury occurs by reason of such blackout or air raid.

Section 7. Lights during Blackout Declared Public Nuisance. Any illumination contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, or any rule or regulation adopted and promulgated in accordance with Section two hereof, constitutes a public nuisance, and the same may be summarily abated by any peace officer, fireman, or Auxiliary Police, using reasonable force if necessary for the purpose of abating such nuisance by extinguishing such illumination.

Section 8. Conflicting Ordinances, Orders, Rules and Regulations Suspended. The provisions of every ordinance of this Town and every administrative order made pursuant thereto, requiring any illumination to be maintained in conflict with this ordinance or with any rule or regulation made pursuant to Section two hereof, or in regard to movement of traffic in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed suspended during the period between any air raid warning signal and the next succeeding all clear signal.

Section 9. Traffic Movement During Air Raids or Blackouts. At the commencement of a period of air raid alarm or blackout, the operator of any motor vehicle, or horse drawn vehicle, shall forthwith bring such vehicle as far as possible to the side of the street, road, alley or highway, and off the main travelled portion thereof, and the operator of a motor vehicle shall bring the same to a stop clear of any crossings, intersection, fire house, fire plug, medical offices or other emergency depot or area, and during the hours of darkness shall extinguish all lights therein or thereon, lock the ignition, but in no case shall the doors of the vehicle be locked if left unattended. In the case of a horse-drawn vehicle, the driver shall bring the same to the side of the street, road or highway, and

immediately halter the horse or horses to a fixed object, if one is available, and if none is available, to the vehicle itself after unhitching said horses. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall operate to limit the authority of any police officer, or other duly authorized officer or person, to prescribe the place and manner of parking or moving such vehicles, in which event operators of such vehicles shall immediately comply with the lawful directions of such officers.

Section 10. Emergency Traffic. The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to blackout emergency vehicles, which shall include the following:

1. All Army and Navy vehicles.
2. All vehicles with United States Government credentials indicating the necessity of emergency movement.
3. Ambulances, municipal, county, state and federal police agency and fire vehicles, and vehicles being then officially used by the several branches of the Civilian Defense Organization, which shall conform to the uniform lighting system prescribed by the Civilian Defense Organization, and bear their official insignia designation.
4. Vehicles actually in emergency service for repair of control of public utility equipment, whether privately or publicly owned.
5. Such other vehicles permitted to move by special order of the Civilian Defense Coordinator, subject to such restrictions as the military authorities may impose, and subject to the uniform lighting system and insignia designation.

All vehicles in emergency use not already visible marked as such shall be marked according to the rules and regulations promulgated by the Civilian Defense Organization, and shall conform to their uniform lighting system. It shall be a violation of this ordinance for any person to operate a motor vehicle with emergency markings unless authorized by the proper peace officer or Civilian Defense authority.

Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed so as to regulate traffic upon the public streets and roadways at times other than during air raids and blackouts.

Section 11. Violations; Penalties. Any person who effects or maintains an illumination, or permits any illumination under his control to be effected or maintained, at any place within the territory covered by this ordinance during any period of air raid alarm or blackout in the hours of darkness, except within a Blackout Structure, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

It shall be unlawful to disobey any lawful direction or order of any peace officer, Auxiliary Police, Air Raid Warden, or Fireman, given during a period of air raid alarm or blackout, which order is reasonably necessary for the maintenance of public order or safety to effect the extinguishment or obscuration of light.

Any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100.00 or by imprisonment. The Municipal Court shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to try all violations arising under this ordinance.

Section 12. General Scope; Extraterritorial Effect; Finding of Emergency. This ordinance is required for the immediate preservation of public peace, health and safety, and shall be enforceable within the Corporate limits of the town of Glenville, and within the extension of one mile beyond such corporate limits, in all directions, the latter being necessary for the reasonable efficient exercise of the powers of this Council, as provided by our state

statute in such cases made and provided, and the provisions herein shall be given the same effect within the one mile extension outside the corporation as within the corporation. The following is a statement of the acts constituting such urgency and exercise of powers: 'The United States is at war and this town is in potential and continuing danger of air attack by the enemy.'

Section 13. Separability of Provisions. If any provision or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this ordinance, which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Section 14. Publication. The Town Recorder shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and cause it to be published once in a newspaper of general circulation throughout the territory covered by this ordinance, printed and published in this town, and thenceforth and thereafter from the date of publication thereof this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.'
