Smith Hired Here As Commerce Instructor


Mr. Denzil D. Smith, of West Union accepted a position in Glenville high school September 11, as instructor in commerical work and social studies.

The representative especially wants to see people age 65 or over, whose claims for old-age insurance payments were previously rejected because of insufficient periods of work in a social security covered job, and who have not recently filed a new

Under the amended law, a worker now 65 years of age needs only six quarters of coverage acquired at any time since 1936 to be eligible for benefits. Mr. Handley urges these people to come to the Count House at 10:30 a. m. and file new claims for old-age and survivors insurance under the new social security law.

In addition, widows with minor children, and guardians of minor children of deceased World War II veterans should see the representative for an explanation of their rights under the amended law. All persons contacting the representa-
