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## Ronnie Jamison Heads New Regime Here; Revolution Ends As All Glenville Teachers Are Ousted, Replaced

### Big Chief 'Blow-A-Lot' Formulates New Set of Rules for Constituents

'Liberty, equality, and more crackers' was the motto chosen by the students of Glenville Public School last week when they decided that it was time for a change in 'ye institution' and ousted the entire faculty, resulting in one of the bloodiest revolutions since Robespierre ended the Reign of Terror in France.

The bloody revolt, which came about because Mr. Jesse Bell, Jr., former principal, would not supply one extra cracker for the students' soup during hot lunch, resulted in considerable damage to the buildings, caused much bloodshed and tears on the part of former faculty members, and saw an entirely new set of rules, the 'Code Jamison', put into effect.

were shot through pop-guns at the supposedly innocent faculty members. Broom handles, spray guns, can openers, corn cutters, shovels, and large economy size mops were among the dangerous weapons used by the students in their fight for more rights and crackers.

Government agents, who were investigating causes of the revolt the first of the week, have revealed that Jamison had the fight planned, step by step. They further indicated that he would not be indicted as the instigator of the overthrow "because anyone who uses their time as wisely as Mr. Jamison does should be principal of a high school." The investigators further commented that "our American Educational System needs more people like Jamison because they would get something done."

After the first attack led by Jamison, the entire student body of the public school joined in the revolt, donning pots and pans on their heads, using dish pans for shields, and wearing tin foil on their bodies for armor.

Peace was finally restored in the halls of the school after the raising of the Jolly Roger and the singing of 'Lollipop', adopted flag and national anthem of the group.

**Teachers Ousted By Bloody Revolt; New Instructors Take Over Classes**

Glenville's top nine teachers, who were ousted out of the Gilmer County public school system yesterday in the most bloody revolution since the Reign of Terror, have indicated to the local school board that they plan to take up new occupations this month.

Ex-principal, Jesse Bell, Jr., who has been replaced by Ronnie Jamison, is making plans to train his English bulldog, George, to retrieve people.

"I wish I had taught George this trick earlier. Maybe I would not have had any trouble with the students," says Mr. Bell.

Mrs. 'Dollie' Murphy, former financier of the Glenville high school student council, has been offered the position as head of the Federal Reserve system, according to word from Washington. The vacancy is now being filled by Marilyn Monroe, who stated last evening that she didn't know a thing about sav-
