## '58 Cage Team Advances Farther Than Any Terror Squad Since '49'

Although the Glenville Red Terrors outplayed and outfought the Flemington Greyhounds in the finals of the Region II-B tournament at Buckhannon March 8, the game Glenville lads, weakened by the loss of key players via the personal foul route in the closing minutes of the hotly contested fracas, finally went down 58-55, as Paul Popovich and company kept up a steady march to the foul lane in the fourth stanza.

The local lads, after upsetting favored Normantown 50-46 to cop Sectional 8-B honors for the second successive year, downed Jane Lew 59-54 in the opening round of Regional play at Buckhannon, March 7. Although the Terrors held a commanding 34-21 edge at intermission in the Jane Lew contest, the Indians came storming back in the second half to outscore the Red Men 33-25.

At one time in the third quarter the Glenville lads held a 49-39 edge over the Greyhounds in the championship game, but at that point Donnie Hughes and Mike Reed drew their fourth personal foul and were removed temporarily from the game.

With four of the five starters shackled with four personals on them, and Glenville reserves struggling hard to maintain a 51-48 third quarter lead, the Greyhounds went ahead of the Terrors 55-53 with one minute to go. At this point, Louie Nocida and Mike Reed left the game with five personals on them, and the Terrors missed numerous lay-ups as the contest

The Vikings, who had narrowly defeated the Red and White team twice during the season, could make but one out of seven foul shots in the fourth quarter, and were held to a mere 16 points in the entire second half.

With the basketball season over, five freshmen from this year's junior high basketball squad will be looking for a place on next year's high school squad, according to Coach 'Woody' Wolfe.

Four of these lads have only one year of experience under their belts while one, Nick Murin, has been a member of the junior high basketball squad for three years.

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The best junior cheerleaders went to the eighth grade cheerleaders who were Kate Stoneking, Vicky Reale, and Janet Nolan.

All-tournament team honors for the high school squad went to Donnie Hughes, Jimmy Wiant, Tommy Reaser, Bob Gainer, Nick Murin and Mike Reed. The best sport award went to Nick Murin, and the best dribbler award was given to John Floyd. Voted the most valuable player was Donnie Hughes. He also scored 47 points to capture high point honors.

The award for putting in the longest shot was presented to Edmund Esposito, and the best dressed team award went to the sophomores. High school cheerleader award went to the sophomore girls who acted as cheerleaders for their team. They were Patti Orendorff, Jorene Butcher, and Carol Ellison. The best cheering award went to the Elementary School section.

A gold cup was presented to the winners, and a silver cup was presented to the runners-up in the tournament.

All people receiving individual awards were presented with a candy bar by Principal Jesse Bell, Jr. Mr. Bell also presented the senior class and the sophomore class with their winning cups.

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Glenville's Red Terrors, who just missed getting into the state basketball tournament by 3 points, sat on the sidelines at Morgantown March 21-22 and watched Parkersburg's Big Reds trounce Stonewall Jackson for the 'A' title and Ansted down Aurora for the coveted 'B' crown.

Part of the expenses of sending the Terrors to the state meet were paid by loyal Glenville business people and Red Terror fans, who were appreciative of the fine showing made by the Glenville lads in tournament play.

All but one of the Glenville squad members were seeing state tourney action for the first time, and, although the Terrors were loud in their praise of Parkersburg's scappy Big Reds, most of the Pine Manor boys felt that they (The Terrors) could have played on even terms with most of the 'B' teams in the meet, with the possible exception of Ansted, who after a miserable performance in downing Baileysville in the opener, sprang to life to look very impressive in the championship bout.

It was a tough blow for the Terrors to lose to Flemington 58-55 in the Regional finals at Buckhannon after holding a 49-39 lead midway in the third quarter.

Up to that point, the local hoopsters had undoubtedly played their best basketball of the season. With Bob Gainer, Jimmy Wiant, and Donnie Hughes grabbing the Bouncy-Backs, and Louie Nocida and Mike Reed racing down the floor at every opportunity, the Terrors were definitely in high gear and getting stronger as they neared the home stretch. But, that old bugaboo, personal fouls, began to have a telling effect, and the Terrors' offensive attack came to a grinding halt.

Most of the Glenville boys felt pretty low about scoring but 4 points in the final quarter against Flemington until they saw highly-regarded Stonewall Jackson score but 14 points against Parkersburg in the second half of the championship game.

A ten-point lead in basketball today, even in the closing minutes, cannot be taken for granted. The 1958 Red Terrors will vouch for that statement — from what they learned in games this year with Normantown, Sutton and Flemington.

With but two boys lost by graduation from the 1958 squad, and a host of promising sophomore prospects coming up, 1959 should be a good year for the Pine Manor school.

first time the Glenville lads had advanced this far in tournament play since 1949, when Bob Turner and mates reached the state tournament, only to be bumped off in the opening round by Oceana, 43-41.

Highly touted Paul Popovich, twice an all-stater and destined to repeat the honor this year, was held to his lowest point total of the year, 22 points on seven field goals and eight foul shots. He did not score a point in the fourth quarter. The previous night against Fairview, the 6' stalwart had scored 42 points, and on several occasions during the year had scored 45 and 50 points in a single contest.

After downing the Tannar Bulldogs 72-59 in the opening round of the Section 8-B tournament, held in the Glenville State College Field House Feb. 27, the Red Men mauled the Troy Trojans 85-59 to earn the right to meet the tournament favorite, the Normantown Vikings, who held an undefeated record in regular season play. Only a defeat at the hands of Parkersburg Catholic in the LKV conference play-off marred their record.

Behind 30-25 at the half-way mark, the rampaging Terrors put on their best defensive performance of the season as they limited the highly touted Vikings to five points in the third quarter to take a 39-35 lead at the three-quarter turn. With Donnie Hughes riding the bench with four personals, Bill Schick, a sophomore, filled the gap admirably as the Terrors played control ball for eight
