Engelke Shows Old Time Faith By Using 1880 Bookkeeping Text

Obviously, Alvin Engelke, a Glenville high school junior, has a great deal of faith in old time publishers. He recently brought to bookkeeping class an 1880 publication of "Mayhew's Practical Book-keeping" for his personal use.

"I know the book was used in 1891 but it was probably used before then," commented Alvin. "My grandfather and great aunt both used the text when they taught school."

The cover of the small (8½" x 6") brown book pictures the balanced scale, indicating the balance that must be maintained in all bookkeeping whether of the 1880 or 1957 vintage.

"I am not sure that the students would respond to the formal instructions if I were to use them today," says Mrs. Rosalea Miller, class instructor,
