## John Dobson, Ham Radio Operator, Picks Up Russian Sputnik On Set

Beep! Beep!

If one had been in John Dobson's home on 6 Whiting Avenue recently, he might have heard the above high-pitched sounds, which, according to young Dobson, was Russia's satellite transmitting from its orbit around the earth.

As the Camden Flats Marconi, a 16-year-old sophomore transferee from Parkersburg high school, sat listening to the sounds coming over the receiving apparatus of his ham operator's outfit, he spied another Glenville high school student passing by. When John went to raise the window to yell at the passer-by to come in and hear the phenomenon his hand accidentally hit the dial and he lost the place.

Both the transmitter and the receiving apparatus, costing about \$500, were bought and paid for from savings made down through the years, says the young radio bug.

When contact is established between "hams", QSL cards are sent by mail from each ham to the other for verification of the contact, says Dobson. The radio wizard has about 60 of these cards, including some from girl operators and some from out of the country.

John lived most of his life in Parkersburg, where his parents owned and operated a General & Real Estate store up until the death of Mr. Dobson a few years ago. Mrs. Dobson is now attending Glenville State College and John has developed other interests besides operation of his radio set. Among these interests are: manager of the Glenville high school and junior high basketball squads, attendance at the local Baptist church, and squiring many

Glenville high school girls around, especially Susie Laymon, another transferee from Garden City, Virginia.
