

# Terrors Stay Undefeated, Edge Sutton Blue Devils 58-55; Will Meet Gassaway Elks And St. Marys In Road Games

## Local Cagers Belt Sand Fork, Troy Trojans On Home Floor

After trailing the Sutton Blue Devile for three quarters, the Glenville Red Terrors, in their final pre-holiday tilt, edged the Braxton countians 58-55 to chalk up their third win in as many starts here the past Monday night.

The Terrors had previously downed Troy 67-48 and Sand Fork 75-54. The win over Sutton enabled the locals to keep their pre-holiday slate clean.

With the locals' efforts directed mainly at stopping the Devils' big 6'6" center, Eddie Stewart, the Terrors, after falling behind 32-27 at the half-way mark, managed to take the lead at 45-44 at the close of the three-quarter pole. With Donnie Hughes taking good care of Stewart, and Jimmy Wiant and Bob Gainer sharing Hughes's rebounding efforts, Mike Reed and Louie Nocida pitched in with their scoring efforts to eke out a three-point win, first cage victory for the Terrors over Sutton since the 1955-56 season.

The Terrors will be idle until Dec. 31 when they take on another Braxton county team, Gassaway, there Dec. 31. Following this encounter, the locals will journey to St. Marys, where they will meet the St. Marys Blue Devils in the first meeting between the two schools.

First home game after the holidays for the Terrors will be Jan. 6 with Burnsville.

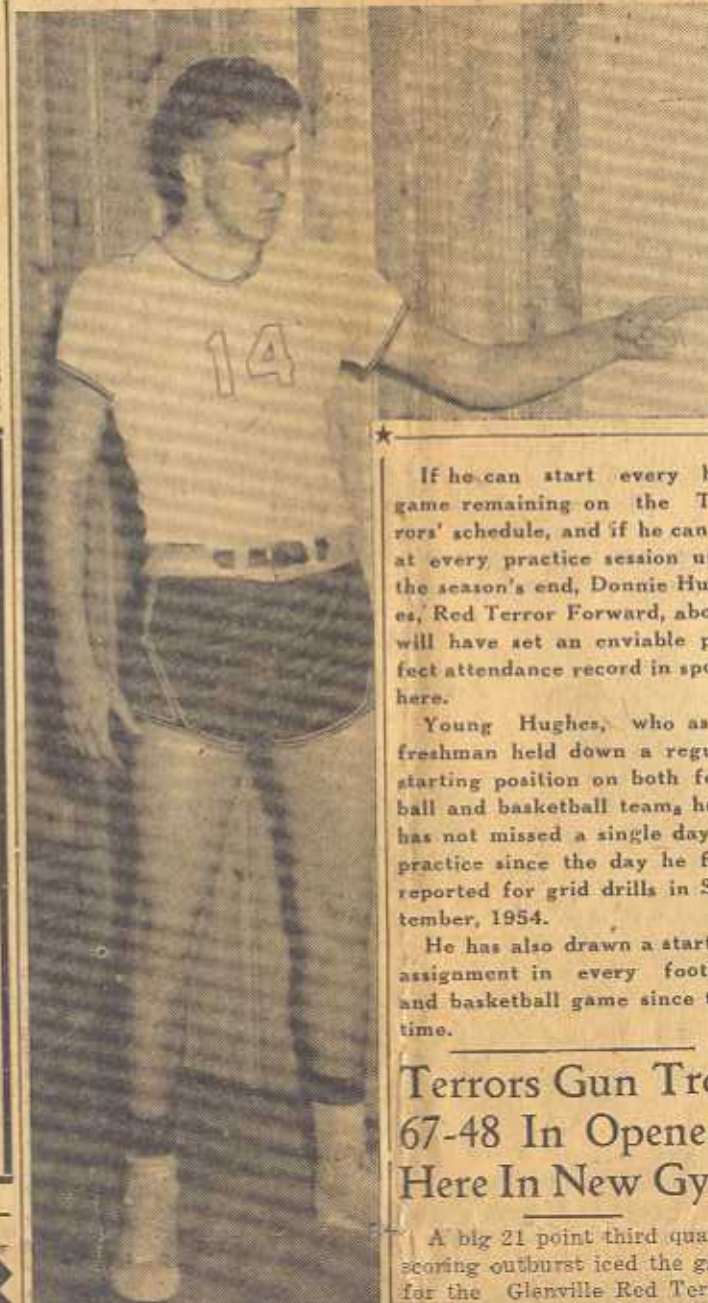
